Intro – Jo Blatti interviewing Diana Gonzales Worthen for First Person Plural in her office, University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, Saturday 8 July 2015

JB Start how, where grew up?

DGW Grew up in Texas, born in California

Father in navy, Monterey Bay, my mother Watsonville, California

55 years old

Four of us born Watsonville, my mother from migrant farm worker background

JB Texas story?

DGW Giddings through sixth grade, going to buy land

Oldest of five, moved to Rockdale near Austin

Junior college Blinn, twirler there, very involved band

I played clarinet, we were very involved

Parents want to give us opportunities they didn't have – Girls Scouts, athletics

JB Your sport?

DGW Not stellar – loved socialization, tennis, volleyball, track

Always band, baton twirling

I never in a million years – karate turned out to be my sport

6 min in

Drama Club, very well rounded

Student Council allowed to visit other parts of U.S. - Kansas City, national conference

First time for me, brand new

5000 population hometown

Fantastic band & athletic programs

Football movies – whole communities

JB Texas, whole Southwest, long Hispanic history, one of many Hispanic families?

DGW In Giddings – half the teachers African American, the only teachers of color

No Hispanic teachers either school district

That was my normal

Not many international students

Were immigrant families, many from Mexico

They struggled, latched onto bi-lingual

Dad's first language Spanish, his family from San Luis Potosi, bi-lingual

All struggled in school

JB Did you learn Spanish at home?

DGW Parents spoke some [esp. if wanting to keep something private], immersed when at aunts, uncles Understood culture, couldn't speak well

Parents: OK, today no one can speak English, total silence, lot of sign language

I married husband, daughter, moved to Arkansas 1996

1996 – influx Hispanics

My Spanish improved Texas to Arkansas – students were teachers

15 min in

I was asked to interpret a lot
I grew up bi-cultural
Very thankful
That's why I was placed
Mexican music at home
Mix Mexican food & American food

JB Your folks' decisions – other decisions

Women in society?

DGW My mother - community - Poland, Italians, Japanese families, just south San Jose

Best strawberries, rich farmland, culturally diverse

Taken aback in Texas

Dad fast pitch softball

1960s restroom white/colored women

20 min in

White, how classified

Mother taught us how to handle things on your own: mow lawn, change a flat, not depend on a man

Very much in favor of marriage an equal

Never thought about it too much

Dad didn't grow up that way: traditional – mother said absolutely not

Totally against the stereotype, dad generally the spokesperson, but after they had discussed

Support you to do whatever you want to do

Must be something beyond high school

25 min in

JB Mother work?

DGW Yes. Generally two jobs

Supervisor housekeeping at local hospital, also cleaned houses on the side

Took me

I had my first house in sixth grade

I did that on the side

JB What did dad do?

DGW Entrepreneur

Alcoa in Rockdale smelting plant initially a clerk, 1 ½ years college, then computer age, scoring very well on math test

Wrote 95% of programs for Alcoa

On side, rental properties

We all helped – we painted, helped with repairs

Often times, immigrant families, dad would finance note

When banks wouldn't give mortgage

30 min in

Did taxes for people

Doing that to this day – mainly Spanish speaking

Tamale house on farm

Mother has M.S. [multiple sclerosis] diagnosed at 48, bound to wheelchair

Father primary caregiver – can tell you all about hotels, ADA accessible, very good complement Mother never met a stranger

We're all big talkers

JB Real testament – could we turn that [small fan off]

How end up at an Arkansas school instead of Texas?

DGW My husband accountant, father-in-law wanted him to work in family business [here in NW Arkansas]

My undergraduate Blinn Junior College

Biology/pre-med University of Houston

Met husband, married, moved to San Antonio

First teaching assignment Lubbock [TX], then Waco, Dallas/Plano Junior High

Gave me grounding, also received M.A. science education

Moved to Arkansas February 1996

38 min in

The goal to stay home with 2 1/2 year old daughter until kindergarten - then business takeover, father-in-law fell ill

Decision for me to go back to work

Only position in the field Rogers ESL/biology

40 min in

My Spanish 'mas o meno' [trans: 'more or less']

Reminded me of my father walking into first grade and not speaking English

My mom's stories of always feeling behind, always traveling

Grandmother's recollections of where/season children born

Stories of my parents growing up

Teachers didn't know how to work with the kids – did their best

Thirty kids per semester dropping, never had that Cultural mismatch
Papa Rap – Al Lopez, that's where I met him
Lived there for a couple of years, hired to keep peace in the cafeteria 'We hate Mexicans' on the walls
A lot of people thought temporary

45 min in

Would move away

Didn't understand teachers

Student: 'I didn't know what, signed up for French; I know Spanish, barely English, signed up for French'

The rule was parents have to come at 7:30 a.m. [to adjust student schedule]. If on the Tyson line – Counselors got tired of seeing me

I tried to be -; I made a lot of phone calls to Mom & Dad

Papa Rap – break dancers group

He did a phenomenal job with the multi-cultural club

I was trying to show gifts my kids had – could do it in Spanish

I would bring encyclopedia [being tossed] to my room, find National Geographics at garage sales

51 min in

That's what led to grant-writing
I would talk to my parents & husband
Kids need resources – ESL & science
I'm in both: can we split it, link class & materials
Ballet Folklorico dance troupe
Math & Science school Hot Springs
Bi-lingual books at library, Springdale – brought in people to read circa 1998

55 min in

At church, cultural mismatch, Spanish/English services Why don't we teach ESL & Spanish classes? AND bring the two classes together, build relationships?

JB Catholic?

PGW growing quickly, used to be 100% white Caucasian
Now largest in state, five services, four in Spanish
Initially no priests that were bi-lingual, eventually Mgr. Scott Friend
After that, always bi-lingual
Going to school part-time, started doctorate
Was offered Holmes scholarship

JB What is that?

DGW Describes Holmes program: goal to increase students of color in education programs nationally, lots of monitoring & mentoring

61 min in

JB Technically, don't qualify ethnicity –thinking of fastball story – complicated matters

DGW Shows where we are, when in college, no faculty of color ESL endorsement in Arkansas, the faculty in back five Latino PhDs

JB Project RISE -

DGW Back up – Rogers. Now immersed in community. Only Hispanic teacher, met others also.

65 min in

Asked thirteen about starting Hispanic Women of Arkansas [HWOA] – purpose to advance educational opportunities for women and children, learn about Hispanic culture, participate actively, describes work of organization, founded 1999

2000-01 U of A, full-time, then went to Springdale, lot of professional development SYOPS – sheltered development strategies

70 min in

Five years - learned about a Kansas State program, through Holmes scholar connection Wrote successful grant to implement in Springdale

RISE is second version in northwest Arkansas – rural areas Green Forest and others Frightening for veteran teachers when don't have the tools & strategies Combination face-to-face & on-line

75 min in

Identifies RISE team members

JB Here almost 20 years, witnessed migration almost in entirety, plus various punditry What do you think has changed?

DGW Different now – if anything, I don't know language – Marshallese

Know who to go to

Fourth fastest growing Latino population in the country

Case study: how communicate? Bi-cultural, cultural sensitivity

This area more astute about that

If newcomer from monolingual area – that different for that person as well

Always a need

For me the students I taught 1996-99, the questions in English: Ms Worthen, your Spanish better

They're applying for citizenship

Their questions about college for kids

82 min in

Student now bi-lingual & going on to post-secondary You still see some of the same things if new to community But now more resources than 20 years

JB Public school system in Little Rock impacted by private schooling –

DGW Not a lot of private schools

Two charter schools as well

85 min in

JB Education has become politicized, whole School of Education [UA-F] accused by *Arkansas Times* [weekly statewide alternative paper] as bought & sold by Waltons –

DGW Hmmm- I work on a grant. I've seen a lot of change, sometimes funding there, sometimes not between Walton, Rockefeller. They're looking at quality of life – two sides.

Endowed chairs, specific purposes

Higher ed[ucation] – diverse thinking, you want that funding, also common ground

90 min in

Example: three of us at college [of education] on U.S. Civil Rights Advisory panel [tuition issue at college level]

A student of mine was last to leave classroom – 'I don't have papers & I want to go to college' No, parents brought me as child

Same way my grandparent became permanent residents/citizens

Doesn't make sense

We had a discussion about that - the Dream Act

I thought that was wonderful [diplomatically does not reveal outcome]

95 min in

That's where I go back to how I was raised Am I really in the right place? What am I doing here?

JB I'm thinking about your daughter –

DGW Senior year Washington University St Louis med school, interested in working with psychiatrically vulnerable populations
Different activities – softball, tried to help her blossom
We don't get degrees in parenting
Call upon friends & family
Raised her to be independent

JB Friends similar upbringing?

DGW Several friends already married, not important to her right now Volunteering at an immigrant health clinic

JB Very curious – political campaigns 2008/2012

JB Carrying the flag or serious?

DGW Ooh, hard -

Asked both times. First time, off guard. Need somebody who understands the community

Approachable, not many

Daughter in sixth grade - of course.

Husband, more protector – have to have thick skin

People curious about how treated, never felt mistreated

People talked to me

Partisanship – 'that party'

106 min in

I didn't win, gave the best shot

More Latino candidates

2012, Arkansas Senate

\$73,000

Tamales to support campaign [parents], my sister

Would like to run again

Mindful of time, compelled to serve

Legislature where I'm drawn

JB Arkansas Nonprofit Alliance

DGW Al Lopez & I – One Community, complemented HWOA

Bring people together

Collaborating with Arkansas Nonprofit Alliance, later ACE [Arkansas Center for Excellence]

Latino & Marshallese leadership

Lot of training of parents – Latino parent

Parents Take Leadership Action – 15 immigrant families and three schools, gifts to table

115 min in

Question: challenge, how solve it as parents

Legacy project at children's school

Just finished third year

Family Literacy program – bi-lingual books, keep kids at grade level over summer

Third year, just finished

Expanded every year, over 1300 books

120 min in [2 hrs]

Then community program Springdale

JB Community cultural festival-

DGW Cultural program Springdale/Shiloh Museum partner, break dancers, mariachis Look out to audience, they all ran out of stuff

800 backpacks filled with books Varity of foods, diverse entertainment

2 hrs 5 min in

Access to services, fun venue

JB How long?

DGW Fourth year, started with Fayetteville, Springdale since, they wanted us

JB Owner martial arts –

DGW Continuing interest – Plano seven, years, sold to my first black belt At night, when not teaching, 75 students
Husband in law school, gave baton lessons Parks & Recreation Self-defense class- loved it
Being coordinated, good workout
1988, female rookie of the year
Little at a time, competed all over the state
Loved teaching, also worked out

2 hrs 15 min in

At Plano, saw how it could help students
Developed 'at risk' karate program nine boys
Five stayed with me, three mornings a week
Principal used coke machine money to support
Senior – all friends have dropped out, but I'm graduating
Following year, we moved
I want my students to be successful, families too

Don't ever have to ask if can put a student in my classroom

JB So generous [with time]

One last question: Arkansas Advocates, Rockefeller Foundation – translate from teacher role?

DGW For both boards -

Advocates, do research, hopefully that can turn into good policy: Ex. ARKids

Other nonprofits – as work together, often same issues

As a board member, easy for me to see examples

That's how I can help: what about undocumented students?

As an educator, you can go to college, but you can't?

I feel I need to speak

In both of them, I served because I believe in their work

Advocates on behalf of families

For Rockefeller – education forward, it's really a good match

2 hrs 25 min

Nonprofits start because somebody not being served

I certainly ask question
I certainly hear both of them [referring to parents]:
My mother: come on use your head
My father: there's always a way

Mother in check out line, little boy in line Adults passing him by, my mother said, 'he's next' These lessons ring true today Don't do this work by yourself So many women –

2 hrs 30 min in

JB Wonderful place to say thank you –
